GREETING:—Through the great mercies of God, we, the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, have brought within two years of the close of the first one hundredth anniversary of our history as a separate and distinct organization.

In 1796 James Varick and others because of the existence of proscription and other conditions which hindered their intellectual development and religious growth, and presented them with engaging in the work spreading the cause of Christ and uplifting their fellows according as they felt themselves moved by the Spirit of God, withdrew from the Mother Church and formed a separate and distinct organization, out of which has grown the great African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church.

We congratulate ourselves on having had a man of such unselfish motives, sterling qualities and pronounced ability as an organizer and leader, to head this great religious movement; he was the first man of the race to grasp the great idea of a purely religious Negro organization. During this hundred years our church has grown from a handful to nearly 400,000 communicants, embracing every section of the United States, Canada, a part of Africa and some of the islands of the Sea. It has taken a foremost part in all movements affecting the moral, intellectual and spiritual welfare of the race.
