How Bicycle Tubing Is Made.

Solid draw steel tubes have been made for years for boilers and general use, but the great demand arose when

the safety type of bleycle came into vorue, the diamond frame requiring the use of a greater length of tubing and necessitating that this should be as light as possible. There are variations in the methods for producing a cold dri wn s'eel tube, but the principle of all is practically the same. Only a very high class of steel is suitable for the pu pose, and that hitherto employed na i been chiefly Swedish charcoal steel, containing a certain proportion of car-The steel is taken in the form of a pillet two feet long and about six inches 'n diameter. A hole is bored through the center and it is heated, an neiled and rolled into the form of a tube about 1% inches in diameter, with wills of about 10 gauge. This is then driwn through a die and over a mandril by means of a draw-bench, until about S00 feet long, beautifully smooth and bright both within and without. This is not drawn at once, but in a number of operations, and between each of them the metal has to be repickled and reannealed to prevent the

cristallization to which the drawing process lends to give rise. The first drawings of the tube leave it about th ee-eighths of an inch thick, but this gridually decreases until a tube is pro duced which is of the thickness of stout

witting paper. This is the class of tube employed in bicycles and that imparts a st ength and rigidity out of all proporticn to its lightness .- Boston Transcript. Wear of Common Roads.



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
