Is will be seen by reference to our nevs columns Henry Plummer Cheathan, of North Carolina, was last week confirmed as Recorder of Deeds for the District of Columbia, and below is a short sketch of the above subject: "Henry Plummer Cheatham was born a slave in Granville county, N. C., Decen ber 2, 1857. He belonged to the well-known Cheatham family of that county of the State and the family always regarded him with particular favor. He attended private schools when a boy and at the age of 18 entered the normal department of Shaw Uni-ver sity, of Raleigh. Three years later, he intered the collegiate department, gra luating in 1882, with the degree of A. B. His college later conferred upen him his degree of A. M. Until 1886 he was principal of the Ply-mo th State Normal School. Then he was elected registar of deeds of Vance county, holding this office until he was elected to the Fifty-first Congress. He was re-elected to the Fifty-second Con-gress. No man of his race has attained more popularity, both in private and pullic life. He enjoys in a marked de-gres the respect of both races. He is wonderfully equipoised. Public prefer-ment has not disturbed it. It is said of him by a Granville Democrat that he "was born a gentleman." While in Congress he saved some money and advisedly invested it in Washing-ton real estate. It can be said of him wh at can be said of very few ex-Con-gre smen-he has an income. 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

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
