An Address Issued to the Colored People of the South.

B. T WASHINGTON PRESIDED.

All to Buy Land, If Only in Small Tracts, While It Can Be Securid at a Low Price.

At the seventh angual Negro conference held in the Normal School pavilion a Tuskegee, Ala, about 2,000 colored 'armers, representing nearly every Southern State, were present. With them were many prominent men and women engaged in the various branches of Negro education. The meeting was enth siastic. The speech of Bishop Grant, of the American Methodist Episcopal Church, was greatly appreciated. Booker T. Washington presided. To enco trage gardening a package of seeds was given to every one present. The result of the conference was the unanimous adoption of the following declara-

"Wherever our people have been read ed by outside influence, we believe there is constant growth in acquiring education, building school houses, ex-tending the school term, developing Christian character, improving and purifying the ministry, securing land, di vers fying crops, raising fruit and poul-try, replacing the one-room cabin, try, replacing the one-room cabin, ceas ng to mortgage crops, getting out

of debt and living more economically.
"In saying this we would not be mis-understood, but emphasize the fact that whe ever the rank and file of our people have not been touched by some outside influence their conditior, as to property, education and morality is most unsatisfactory and will demand for a long time the carnest help and thought of the best people of our country. The possession in larger degree try. The possession in larger degree of the elements of strength enumerated abo e, we believe, will constitute the four dation for all the Ligher rights and privileges of citizenship which every race should enjoy. Since the indepen lence of our people in the Gulf States, lies in agriculture, we strongly urgo that along with the other forms of edu ation, special stress be laid upon trai ing in agriculture. We earnestly urgo all to buy land, if only in small tracis, while it can be secured at a low price. We would call attention to the large amount of government land in the South open to settlement. We deen it of vital importance that the educa ed young men and women bear in mird that they owe it to the race to give to the more unfortunate the benefit of the reducation in every way possible. We urge that local Negroes' conference or other organizations with the same object be formed throughout the South. believe the holding of annual county fairs would prove most helpful.
