Thompson, the energetic Chairman, of a beautiful gold medal bearing on one side a fac-simile of the Douglass monument and on the other an inscription. Mr. Thompson was the first to suggest the building of the monument, a suggestion which he made in a Masonic meeting before the great emancipator died. This was the first time the colored people had ever perpetuated the memory of any of their race.—Rochester (N. Y.) Herald.
