Members who have attended this Conference for years declared it one of the ablest addresses ever delivered before this organization.

A great many visitors were present, among them Revs. E. Geo. Biddle, fraternal delegate from the New York Conference, J. S. Caldwell, of Philadelphia, J. B. Colbert, President V. C. E., Geo. L. Sides, of the Central North Carolina Conferences, were transferred to this Conference, received and given work.
