How To Deepen Spirituality

From an Address delivered at Laymen's Meeting, Perry Street, Montgomery, Ala.

THE present church has methods for reaching the unsaved and aiding in the spiritual growth of its people, but are we making use of these agencies in a systematic, organized way? No plan which fails to bring into use the united efforts of the people can produce results which measure up to the great mission of the church.
