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MISS LUCINDA PEACE.

On February 22, 1917, Miss Luinda Peace died at the home of er birth, near Fairport, Granville o., in the eighty-seventh year of er age.

She lived on the same spot through early three generations. Few of s can imagine what changes she aw in those eighty-seven years.

She attended Bethel Church and ntertained the Methodist preachrs, though she was not a member f the Methodist Church.

She read her Bible much and her aith in her Savior was strong and biding.

The year before she died she deded to give her property to the ethodist Orphanage at Raleigh. fter leaving bequests of about 3,000 to her old cook and five of er children and grandchildren, she eft the remainder, consisting of er farm of 225 acres, and several housand dollars to the Orphanage, o be known as the Lucinda Peace fund, the income of which will suport four or five orphans for all ime to come. What better disposiion could she have made with her ceans? She will be remembered ne hundred years from now by this egacy.

Sixteen years ago, Miss Margaret Peace, a double first cousin, living a ew hundred yards from her, died, eaving four times as much proprty as Miss Lucinda left. She gave t to about fifteen different legatees, nd not one of them has thought enough of her memory to mark her grave. Today practically all of that estate has passed out of the hands of the legatees, and all seem to have forgotten their benefactor.

Miss Lucinda will be remembered for all time by her legacy to the Methodist Orphanage, as her uncle is known by his gift to Peace Institute in Raleigh.

I saw much of her the last two years of her life, and I shall not forget her simple faith and trust in her Savior.

The old Peace Bible is over 160 years old. It is the second oldest in the State, and has been given to Trinity College where it can be seen for the years to come.

The fact that she had willed her property to the Orphanage was a great comfort to her in her last days. She often talked to me about it, and also to Brothers Barnes and Willis, who visited her.

We shall cherish her memory and the orphan will call her "Blessed." -J. P. Hunt.
