The entire University committee was shocked upon hearing recently of the deaths of two members of the Freshmen class of the University, William Cameron, of Hillsboro, and Wil-Ham Thomas Dortch, Jr., of Goldsboro. Young Cameron left the University last week in perfect health to spend a few days at his home in Hillsboro. While there he was stricken with paralysis, and died very suddenly. Dortch has been out of school since the holidays, when he was operated on for appendicitis. It was thought that he was progressing nicely, but on Monday the sad news was received that he had succumbed to the effects of the operation and had died of blood poisoning.



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
