Historical Research—Prof. Brooks Traveling—Other Notes.

Hearn Not With Ball Team—Y. M. C. A.—Other Notes.

(Special Star Correspondence.) Trinity College, Durham, N. C., Feb. 11.

(Special Star Correspondence.) Chapel Hill, N. C., Feb. 12.—It recently became known that "Bun" Hearn had severed his connection with the University.

The Johns Hopkins press has just published as one of the University series of Studies in History and Political Science a volume by Dr. W. T. Laprade, assistant professor of History at Trinity. Its title is England and France, 1789-1797, and the author throws an interesting light on the relation between the two nations. His conclusions are that the French Revolution had little direct influence on the English people, but sympathy for the revolution was distorted into an issue by William Pitt for the purpose of disrupting the Whig party, and when that was accomplished, it was used as a means for commercial supremacy.

The author's investigations are based mainly on newspapers, pamphlets, and manuscripts in the libraries of Baltimore, Washington, and at the British Museum. It is also of interest to note that Dr. Laprade intends to continue his study of England and France in and through the Napoleonic period. Those who have read the present volume pronounce it a distinct addition to the knowledge of English politics and it has received much favorable criticism which corresponds to the impression Mr. Laprade has made as a teacher and a student.

Prof. E. C. Brooks, of the Department of Education, left Thursday morning on a tour to several points in the eastern part of the State. On Thursday evening he was scheduled to speak at Dover; on Friday evening at Beaufort, under the auspices of the Literary and Historical Society; and on Saturday morning to the teachers of Craven county.

A civic celebration is held each year on February 22nd, which is always observed as a holiday. It is intended that the occasion shall be of service in cultivating a better citizenship and more patriotic ideas of government. The address this year will be delivered by Dr. J. W. Lynch, pastor of the First Baptist church, of Durham. The exercises this year promise to be of very great interest.

The preliminary contest to select representatives for the Trinity-Sewanee debate will be held February 26th. The subject for debate is "Resolved, That a graduated income tax, with an exemption of incomes below \$5,000 per annum, would be a desirable modification of our system of Federal taxation. Trinity has the negative. The debate will be held at Sewanee, the last one being held in Durham.

Dr. S. B. Pearce, of Roanoke Rapids, who was formerly a Trinity student, has decided to locate in Durham for the practice of medicine. Dr. Pearce, who has been in Durham this week, has gone to Norfolk to do some special work, and will take up his residence in Durham April 1st.

The publication committee of the college is now at work on the new catalogue for 1909 and 1910. The greater part of the copy is in the hands of the printers. The catalogue will be ready for distribution by March 15th.

On Monday night Prof. M. C. S. Noble, Prof. of Pedagogy in the University, spoke before the Historical Society of the University on "Scotch-Irish in North Carolina." Dr. A. H. Patterson, of the Physics Department, made a most interesting and instructive talk before the Elisha Mitchell Scientific Society on Monday night on "Comets."

Plans Accepted for New Engineering Building—Other News.

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 12.—Today the Executive Committee of the board of Trustees accepted the plans of Architect Frank Simpson, of Raleigh, for an engineering building. His plans were submitted along with those of eight other architects. The approximate cost of the building will be \$50,000, which will be located west of the Textile Building, facing Hillsboro Road. It is to be 173 feet long, 90 feet wide, three stories in height, including a basement, and is to be constructed of reinforced concrete. The basement and first floor will be occupied jointly by the Department of Civil and Electrical Engineering. The second floor will be used entirely by the Department of Chemistry, including class rooms and laboratories. The above departments are at present located in the Main Building. The contract for the construction of the building will not be let before about April 15th.

Dr. A. Rudy, head of the Department of Modern Languages, is a great advocate of Esperanto, the international language, and is endeavoring to interest the students of the college and the people of Raleigh generally in its coming value and importance as a language to be used at international Congresses and tribunals. Dr. Rudy is trying to establish a North Carolina State Esperanto Association, the dues of which are 50c per year for charter members.

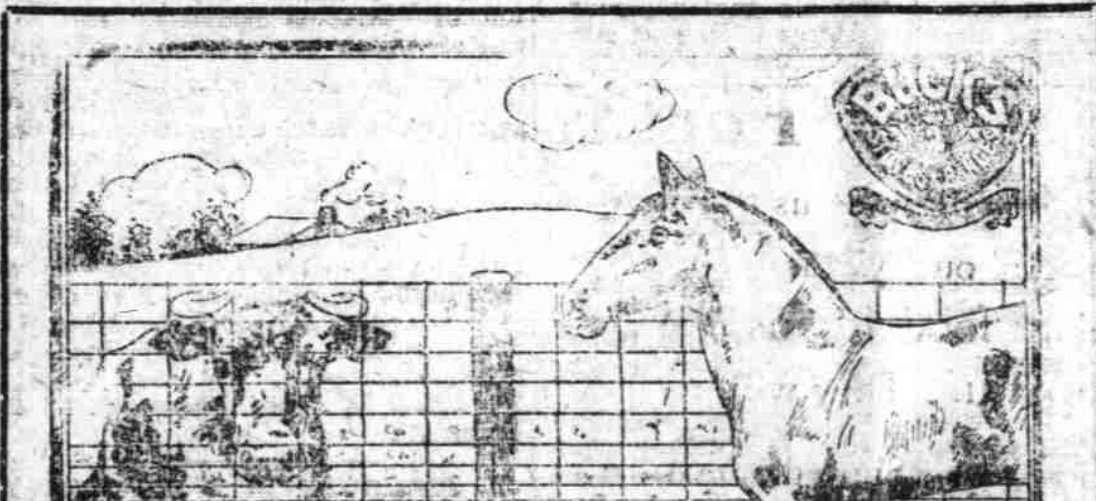
