### THE COTTON MARKET.

New York, April 6.—There was a sharp

recovery in today's cotton market as a result of renewed bull support and covering, with May contracts selling at 14 1/2¢ or 2¢ points above the previous day's closing, 28 points above the low level reached on the big break of yesterday afternoon. The highest prices were recorded late in the day, and the market then turned net up on reports that the market was still net up after the better trade demand for spots. Wall street houses became quite heavy buyers; there was active covering in all the late trading there was no real movement of cotton from oil leaders, while the increasing May premium suggested that the concentrated long interest in the next months had not been foisted on the market by the speculators.
