Died in Richmond of Gunshot Wounds Received While Arresting Negro Blind Tiger-Funeral at

(Special Star Correspondence.)

Rocky Mount, N. C., Sept. 21 .- After battling for life with great odds against him, and with a gunshot wound in his chest that would have meant death to a majority of men, Chief of Police Jim Stallings died this morning shortly after 9 o'clock at the Johnson-Willis Hospital in Richmond where he was taken as a last hopes of prolonging his life.

His death has been expected almost hourly since he was fired upon on Sunday night by the negro Norman Lewis, who was on yesterday captured at Henderson and carried to Raleigh last night for safe keeping. The dead officer was 46 years old and léaves a widow and five children, along with several sisters and brothers.
