Delivered Stirring Address Before "1919 Society" on Good Citizenship-Many Heard Him With Rare Interest.

(Special Star Correspondence.) Trinity College, Durham, N. C., Washington, the father of his country, was celebrated at Trinity College yesterday. A general holiday was observed throughout the day, and the students indulged in whatever kind of pastimes they wished. The members of the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity, accompanied by the young ladies and chaperoned by Prof. and Mrs. W. K. Boyd, spent the day on a picnic near Chapel Hill.

The big celebration of the day, however, was that of the "9019 Society." In the evening, at 8 o'clock in the Memorial Hall, the annual address cuit Court. His subject was "Good Citizenship," and never has a speech of such wonderful power and ability this subject. Judge Pritchard spoke of that high type of citizenship which everyone knows is his ideal, and which permeates his own life. In good citizenship Judge Pritchard sees the aversion of every public peril in safety from infidelity, anarchy, socialism, and from every evil wind that blows. Beginning his speech with the statement that he was glad to be honored by delivering a speech on such an occasion at a college that has always stood for that highminded patriotism and citizenship as had Trinity College, he proceeded to pay a glowing tribute to the great man in whose honor the day was celebrated. He compared him with Caesar, Alexander and Napoleon, and said that neither had done a greater service for their country than had George Washington for his.

The speaker then departed from his manuscript, which he said was He said that two things were essent-

"Our boys and girls are our greatest assets," he said. nowadays about the conservation of our forests and our water power: but the greatest thing for us to conserve is our young manhood and womanhood." He often quoted from McKinley, Roosevelt and Cleveland, and said that the South was less affected by the bad and undesirable element of foreign immigration than the North, but since we had welded our Union into one great Republic, the cause of Massachusetts was the cause of us all, and we were as much Jas.
