BRIBERY CHARGES AGAINST LORIMER

Senate Sub-Committee is Named to Make New Investigation.

WILL PROBE CASE AT ONCE

Four Democrats and Four Republicans Named—Half of Committee Voted in Illinois Senator's Favor at Hearing.

Washington, June 5.—Senators Dillingham, Gamble, Jones and Kenyon, Republicans, and Fletcher, Johnston, Kern and Lea, Democrats, will constitute the sub-committee that will conduct the new investigation into the bribery charges against Senator Lorimer. They were named for this duty today by the Committee on Privileges and Elections and are all ready to begin services with all the authority of a full committee as soon as the Senate approves. Of the eight members, Messrs. Dillingham and Gamble, Republicans, and Fletcher and Johnston, Democrats, voted for Lorimer in the previous investigation. Mr. Jones, Republican, voted against him. Messrs. Kenyon, Republican, and Kern and Lea, Democrats, were not then members of the Senate. They are known, however, to be opposed to Mr. Lorimer.

The committee considered first Mr. Kenyon's motion directing the investigation as a whole, but after brief discussion it was rejected by a vote of 19 affirmative votes being cast by Senators Kenyon, Clapp and Jones. The resolution providing for the appointment of a sub-committee of eight was proposed by Mr. Bailey, senior Democratic member of the committee, and it named Messrs. Dillingham, Gamble, Clapp and Sutherland, Republicans, and Messrs. Fletcher, Johnston, Kern and Lea. This resolution was defeated 16-12. Mr. Johnston had refused to permit the use of their names and insofar as its impartiality could be assumed, among those declining to serve on the ground of other engagements were Messrs. Bailey and Painter, Democrats, and Heyburn, Republican.

When the list was read Messrs. Clapp and Sutherland voluntarily retired in favor of Messrs. Kenyon and Johnston. Contending for the rule of seniority, Mr. Bailey suggested that Messrs. Bradley and Oliver should be designated. When, however, it was pointed out that both of those senators were ineligible, because, in the previous inquiry they had voted for Lorimer, the Texas senator yielded and the Iowa and Washington senators were added to the list.

The sub-committee adopted a resolution for presentation to the Senate tomorrow to clothe the sub-committee with all the powers of a special committee. It is expected that the resolution will encounter comparatively little opposition.

INTERNATIONAL POLO GAME.

Rain Interferes With Contest Between Americans and British.

New York, June 5.—Interest in the international polo cup series—with the American defenders in possession of the first game by a close score, is stretched over at least another 21 hours because of a storm. The rain which delayed the first match from Wednesday to Thursday last week, came even heavier during the forenoon today and caused postponement of the second contest. WILL HEAR SECRETARY KNOX

Newspaper Publishers Were Heard Yesterday—Associated Press Denies That It Sent Out Prejudiced Reports.

Washington, June 5.—Public hearings in the Canadian reciprocity bill were concluded by the Senate Finance Committee today, representatives of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association and of the Associated Press being the last to appear before the committee.

Secretary of State Knox, at the request of Senator Bailey, has been asked to explain to the committee tomorrow whether the Root amendment to the paper section of the bill providing that it shall not be in force until the President is satisfied and has issued a proclamation to the effect that paper and wood pulp are being admitted free into all the provinces of Canada, is in full accord with the agreement as understood by the commissioners from both countries who prepared the treaty. On Wednesday the committee will take up the bill in executive session to discuss committee action.

TO FIGHT LOWER CALIFORNIA.

At San Antonio, Tex. June 5.—It was reported today that leaders of the Mexican Cientifico party will meet in New York City within two weeks to form a new party and a campaign fund for the Presidency of Mexico.

GIANT HONORS FOR MADERO.

Mexico City, June 5.—When Francisco I. Madero, Jr., enters the capital on Wednesday thousands will greet him at the station and soldiers of the army which he whipped will line the streets. In his honor military bands will play and the police, whose duty it once was to arrest him who carried "Viva Madero," will join in the greeting.

HAD TO PAY WIFE \$75,000.

New Haven, Conn., June 5.—Judgment has been satisfied in the divorce case of Mrs. Eva Swarthout Wheeler against her husband, Professor H. L. Wheeler, in which alimony of \$100,000 was awarded by the courts, according to papers filed today. The amount of the actual settlement is not given, but he understanding is that a compromise was reached for about \$75,000. Professor Wheeler, whose resignation from the Yale faculty has been accepted, went to Chicago after the decision in the case was made public. The ground upon which a divorce was granted was cruelty.
