

**AFFAIRS AT STATE CAPITAL**

**Wilson Depot Hearing Continued—** Charters by Secretary of State—Appeals from Tenth Judicial District—Notes

(Special Star Correspondence.)

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 30.—The Corporation Commission announces the continuation of the hearing in the matter of the petition of citizens of Wilmington for the Atlantic Coast Line and the Norfolk-Southern to provide a union passenger station from November 28th, the hearing to be in Wilson. This is the case in which the Norfolk-Southern is resisting its union station on the ground that its comparatively new station is entirely adequate and creditable to the town, that the company is according to Wilson and that section of its railway system a passenger service considerably in excess of what the revenue of the road justifies and also on the ground that if a union station is required it should not be at the present A. C. L. station, as the petitioners ask, but at the present junction of the two roads.

The Secretary of State has chartered the Beck Machine Co., Winston-Salem, capital \$25,000 by W. E. Beck, C. L. Beck, Ernest Remington and others; the Jennings-Alken Co., Greensboro, \$20,000, by C. W. Jennings, Ben W. Alken and others for fruit and produce business, automobile business, including transfer and baggage. The C. M. Hunt Lumber Co., Apex, Chatham county, capital \$2,400, by C. M. Hunt and others.

The appeals from the Tenth Judicial District will be called for argument in the Supreme Court tomorrow with 24 cases on the calendar, including State vs. Broadway, from Rowan county, in which the issue is raised as to whether the act repealing the five-year punishment for incest and enacting a new act making it fifteen years sentence made it impossible to punish an offender whose crime was prior to the change in the law made by the recent Legislature, through the old act being repealed and the new act not applying to old offenses.

Governor Kitchen announces a reward of \$200 for Walter Poovey, wanted in Caldwell county, for the murder of Pinkney Ward, on November 26th, 1910. Poovey is only 19 years old and is a sandy-haired, full-faced fellow.

Judge Frank Carter is to convene a special term of Robeson county Superior Court October 30th, to continue one week for the trial of civil cases. The commission for his court is just issued by Governor Kitchen.

**STATE NURSES PASS.**

**Eighteen Licensed at Durham—McKenna Treatment—Interesting Suit.** (Special Star Correspondence.)

Durham, N. C., Oct. 28.—Eighteen nurses passed the State board for license to practice their profession, the semi-annual examination being held here this week with Oscar McKenna, of Elizabeth City, directing the questions. The number of applicants were unusually large. The young women made a splendid showing, and all passed successfully. The examinations were held in the class room of the Watts Hospital. Wilmington appears to have had the largest representation of applicants being from that city.

The highest average in the class was made by Miss Hezel Deen Hamlin, of Wilmington, who was closely followed by Miss Reid Blalock, of Winston-Salem. There was a difference of just one-tenth of one per cent. between the two. A suit has been instituted against the Virginia-Carolina Chemical Company for damages to health and property. The prosecuting lawyers are ex-Judge J. C. Biggs, of the Trinity law faculty, and Lawrence Tomlinson, Esq., and the suit is being brought by John Hayes and Sarah Evansworth, colored. In the plaintiff's statement of damages, it will be charged that the whole community within a radius of a half mile within the reach of the company's plant at East Durham, has been hurt by the deposit, the gases and fumes coming from the manufacture of fertilizer, and that the odor is damaging to the health of that community. These cases are only a beginning, for it is estimated that there are now a dozen or more suits of a like nature in court or headed that way.

Dr. J. J. McKenna, famous over the State for his reputation for curing drinkards of the liquor habit, was in the city a few days ago. He has at his sanitarium in Reldsville two of the worst cases of pellagra that have been developed in this city. He is treating them free of charge, to demonstrate his ability to handle the cases, and has offered to pay the expenses of newspaper men to that town if they will observe and report the condition of his patients. Dr. McKenna says that the patients are getting along well, and that the disease is yielding to the treatment in an astonishing manner.

The friends say she was poisoned with strychnine. Sheriff Richardson was seen by the Star's correspondent this morning. He says there has been no warrant issued and he does not think there is anything in the charge, and that Mrs. Thompson died from natural causes. There is considerable excitement over the report.
