The Diamond Jubilee Oak Ridge Institute—Sixty Years of Progress

Oak Ridge, N. C., May 8.—On Wednesday and Thursday, 15th and 16th of this month, the Diamond Jubilee of Oak Ridge Institute will be celebrated in great style.

The school re-organized immediately following the war and continued its successful work, undisturbed by fire and other calamities, under such men as O. C. Hamilton, Pendleton King, C. D. Hines and W. S. Crouse, until the Spring of 1875.

In September of that year J. Allen Holt took charge of the school. In the year of '78 and '79 he was joined by his brother, Martin H. Holt, a partnership being formed which has lasted until the present time.

The work done by this school in the preparation of men for successful entrance into the various colleges of our country, for the various professions open to wide awake young men in the various departments of business life, is too well known throughout the South to need at the hands of commendation.
