WANT WOMEN JURORS

Federation of Women's Clubs Endorse Their Appointment. Winston-Salem, N. C., May 9.—An endorsement of the movement for the appointment of women as judges of juvenile courts was voted at today's session of the State Federation of Women's Clubs in session here. The organization also endorsed the movement launched by the Federated Women's Clubs of the country for a mammoth peace monument, to be placed at the entrance to the Panama canal and accepted the invitation of the Colonial Dames of North Carolina to participate in the unveiling of a memorial tablet to the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence at Raleigh, May 20th.

Underwood Defeated Wilson by 8,000 Votes—State Officers. Jacksonville, Fla., May 9.—The State Democratic Executive Committee met here today and canvassed the vote of the primary held April 30th, showing the following results: For President, Underwood 28,343; Wilson 20,482. For Governor, Trammell 27,111; Wilson 12,409.

FEDERAL AID TO ROADS

Senator Simmons' Proposal Likely to Become the Law. Washington, D. C., May 9.—During the extra session of Congress held last year Senator Simmons in an exhaustive speech which was published with approval throughout the United States, was the first one in this country to take the position that the government in using the farmers' roads for carrying the mails under the rural free delivery system and the use of those roads for carrying the rural parcels post packages which was in contemplation had incurred a liability to contribute towards keeping them in good condition.

In this speech he maintained that the government was using the railroads for carrying the mails but that it paid the railroads for that use while paying the farmer nothing for the use of his roads and that the moral obligation to pay for the use of the farmer's roads was the same as in the case of the railroads.

In a number of good roads speeches made by him in the State last Fall after referring to the great interest which was shown in his proposition in the Senate at the time of the delivery of his speech he predicted that before the present Congress adjourned a law would be passed requiring the government to bear a proportion of the expense of keeping up the dirt roads of the country which were used for postal purposes. It is gratifying to the friends of Senator Simmons to know that already the House of Representatives, which initiates appropriation bills, has acted upon the proposition by putting in the Postoffice Appropriation Bill a clause providing that wherever the government is using a road for postal purposes it shall pay for its maintenance from \$15 to \$25 per mile per annum, according to the character of the road.

COL. HORNE'S CONDITION

Continues Very Ill at Greensboro—Meredith Endowment. (Special Star Correspondence.) Greensboro, N. C., May 9.—Col. Ashley Horne continues very ill in his room at the Hudson Hotel, though his physicians have assured members of the family here that there is no reason for alarm and that with a good rest, the patient will more than likely recover. Mrs. Horne hopes that his condition may show a sufficient improvement to allow the removal of the sick man to his home at Clayton within the next few days. Col. Horne is allowed to receive many of his friends in his room and all who have seen him state that he seems cheerful, yet that it is apparent he is far from a well man. He has great difficulty in talking, though he has partially regained control of some of the muscles affected by the stroke of paralysis which he suffered while a passenger on the Mason reunion special.

Greensboro Baptists have answered nobly the call of Meredith College, of Raleigh, contributing during the past 10 days \$1,360 toward the \$100,000 endowment fund. Dr. R. T. Vann, G. E. Linberry and Dr. C. J. Thompson, who have been here for several days visiting local Baptists, express great encouragement over the results of their visit and express confidence in the final success of their purpose. They have already visited in Winston and Charlotte and report a liberal response by Baptists of those cities to their cause.

The Greensboro Country Club will be formally opened tomorrow afternoon with public receptions in the afternoon and evening. The magnificent club house has been elaborately prepared for the opening, while the prepared grounds and lawns have been put in tip-top order. The club is located about two miles from the Court House and is within a quarter of a mile from the Elm street car line. It occupies a commanding position on a sloping ground. The property including more than 60 acres, a part of which is under cultivation. A feature of the new club is a splendid golf course, the links being said to be among the best in the State. Tennis courts and all of those things which go with a country club, with the possible exception of lockers, are provided. The club, though, is "dry" in every sense of the word and is to be a home for ladies as well as the men of the city.

CRAIG AND DAUGHTERIDGE

Both Candidates at Greensboro—Memorial Day Exercises Today. (Special Star Correspondence.) Greensboro, N. C., May 9.—Hon. E. L. Daughtridge, of Rocky Mount, a candidate for lieutenant governor, spent today in Greensboro and Guilford county greeting his friends and renewing acquaintances made during his long service as a State legislator and chairman of the State Fair. Mr. Daughtridge is on a tour of the western part of the State with a view to mending up his political fences. Tonight Mr. Daughtridge will go to Charlotte, spending a couple of days in Mecklenburg and then on into western counties. In the event Mr. Daughtridge is nominated Greensboro has today entertained both the next Governor and Lieutenant Governor of the State, Hon. Locke Craig coming here from Asheville this afternoon to spend the night with friends and to deliver the annual memorial address before the Guilford Camp of Confederate Veterans tomorrow morning.

COLORED CHILD KILLED

Accidentally Shot While Playing With Gun—Aycock Memorial. (Special Star Correspondence.) Washington, N. C., May 9.—News reached this city today of the accidental shooting of a six-year-old colored girl by her brother, aged seven. From what can be learned, John Evans, a colored laborer on the farm of Mr. Sylvester Fleming, in Chocowinity township, had his two children out in the field with him while at work. Having heard that wild turkeys were in the vicinity Evans had taken his gun in order to be prepared to bag one if he should be lucky enough to find it. He hid the gun which was loaded in some bushes where he thought it would be out of the children's way, and went on to his work. His children wandered off to play, but about an hour Evans was startled by the report of a gun, and rushing in the direction he found his daughter lying on the ground with blood streaming from her breast and in a dying condition. He picked the child up in his arms and rushed for assistance but he was unable to get her to a doctor before she died.

KINSTON SCHOOL CLOSSES

Graduating Exercises—Kinston Ball Team—Boy is Injured. (Special Star Correspondence.) Kinston, N. C., May 9.—The commencement exercises of the Kinston schools began last night. The program then, which consisted of class day exercises, was in charge of the senior class of the High School. This morning the Faulkner declamation prize, an annual award, was presented. This evening the graduation address was made by Prof. Graham, of the University of North Carolina, and tomorrow the session of 1911-12 will end officially, although there will be no studies, it being a holiday. The Kinston baseball team, composed of practically the same talent that defeated the local club in the Coast Line league last season, will begin the season tomorrow in Greenville. The team is stronger, possibly, than last year, and has been substantially backed for a full season of amateur sport. William Turner, a 12-year-old white boy, was badly injured in an accident at the Kinston Manufacturing Company's lumber plant. Young Turner, with a comrade, was riding on a box car, and was caught between the car and a pile of lumber. The lad sustained a fractured leg and severe internal injuries. He was given attention by the company's surgeon.
