COTTON ADVANCES 22 POINTS; WHEAT AND OATS WERE HEAVY STOCKS MADE FURTHER GAINS

Continued Trade Buying and Covering of Shorts Sent Prices Up Sharply—Close Firm, 5 to 22 Points Higher.

New York, Jan. 22.—There was a further sharp advance in the cotton market today, with March contracts selling about half a cent above Monday's low level on continued trade-buying and covering of shorts.

Chicago, January 22.—Wheat and oats were heavy and slightly lower today; corn firm and provisions steady.

Cash oats advanced 1/4 to 1/2 cent, but futures were unchanged. Provisions closed a shade over yesterday.

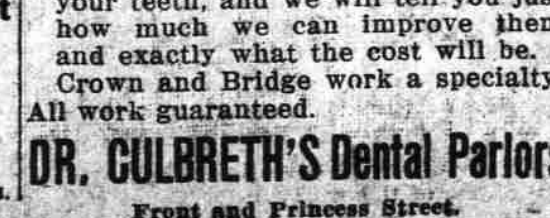
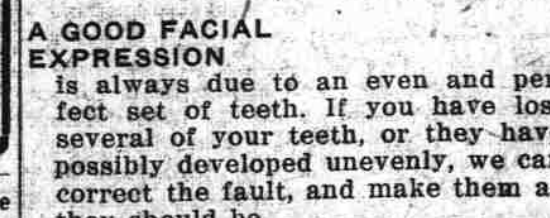
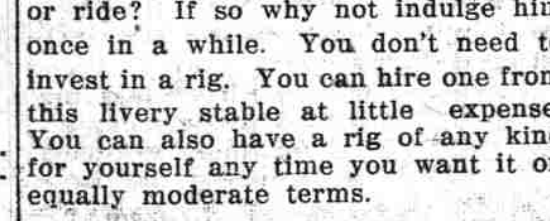
