Her captain and crew of 25 men were saved by the before daybreak on Haisborough sands in the North Sea, during a blizzard. terrific seas. The crew was in a desperate plight and had lost hope when the Amer came up, launched a life boat and made several perilous but successful trips. The captain and mate of the Marie refused to leave their ship until every man had been saved. The Amer's life boat was too much battered by the waves to return for them and the steward of the French boat dived from the Amer with a life line and swam to the wreck. He and the captain and mate were ultimately dragged through the sea to the rescuing vessel.

Wilson Hopes to do Most of Tariff Fighting Before Extra Session

The President Thinks a Preliminary Threshing Out of the Measure Will Make Its Sailing Easy When It Comes Up

Washington, March 22 .- President Wilson hopes to do most of the fighting for tariff revision before Congress begins its work early in April. The President is of the opinion that it is better to do the talking and the fighting-if any is necessary-before the special session is far along, rather
