WILSON VETOES.

Sends His First Negative Answer Congress. Oct. 23.—President Wilson today sent his first veto to Congress. He disapproved a joint resolution to reinstate Rudolph Unger, of Mansfield, Ohio, as a cadet at West Point. Unger, appointed by Representative Sharp, failed in examinations after a strenuous effort to succeed and his friends sought another change for him.

"I regret to do this, but I deem it my duty," wrote the President. "I have the greatest sympathy and admiration for young men like Mr. Unger who seek in spite of difficulties to show their mettle; but upon careful inquiry I am convinced that he cannot with his present preparation. cannot, with his present preparation. advantageously continue his course at the West Point Military Academy and that his reinstatement would, in the circumstances, be subversive to the
