Hester's statement of the world's visible supply of cotton issued today shows the total visible to be 6,145,585 against 6,108,949 last week and 6,105, 861 last year. Of this the total of American cotton is 4,515,585 against 4,547,949 last week and 4,750,861 last year; and of all other kinds, including Egypt, Brazil, India, etc., 1,630.000 against 1,561,000 last week and 1,355,000 last year.

Of the world's visible supply of cot-ton there is now affoat and held in Great Britain and continental Europe 3,109,000 against 3,497,000 last year; in Egypt 374,000 against 329,000 last year; in India 679,000 against 627,000 last year, and in the United States 1,-984,000 against 1,653,000 last year.

Market Has Shown a Generally Stea-New York, Jan. 23.—The cotton market has shown a generally steady undertone during the past week, although a tendency to take profits preceeding the report of the census bureau on ginning to January 16th caused some irregularity, and its pub considerable scattering liquidation with today's closing prices showing reactions of 18 to 20 points from the best. The amount of cotton reported ginned between January 1st and 16th consistent with minimum crop views pased on the returns to the end of December. The spinning value of the crop, however, is supposed to be considerably modified by lighter weight bales, and an unusually large proportion of low grades or inferior staples ble mill requirements has led many operators to place less stress upon differences of opinion regarding the apparent volume of supply, with the result that more attention is now engaged by the state of demand, pending the season for preliminary new crop preparations. A further easing of foreign money markets, the increas-

ed strength and activity of securities and continued reports of a good spot demand in the South have been em hasized by those who are predicting that the season's requirements of American cotton will fully equal the early bullish predictions. Bullish sentiment also seemed to be encouraged by reports that leading trade interests were free buyers on today's decline but there was more bearish talk around the ring after the close to night than there had been early in the week and people who had liquidat ed recent purchases, seemed to ap prehend that the increased view of the crop might unfavorably influence the attitude of spot business or remaining holders. Much of the increased spot demand reported during the week is supposed to have come from exporters and local spot people estimate that a large percentage of this business has represented the fill ng of old contracts for January ship February is usually a quiet month in the spot department, and the attitude of mills with reference to fresh busi-


