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NEW RULING IS ISSUED

U. S. Bonds, State Bonds, Etc., Are Liable to Inheritance Tax, Says Corporation Commission.

(Special Star Correspondence.) Raleigh, N. C., April 7.—Following the recent ruling of the Corporation Commission that real estate inheritances that have passed to heirs since the enactment of the 1905 Revenue Act and prior to the passage of the 1913 Revenue Act specifically fixing such tax on realty inherited, are liable to the property inheritance tax prescribed in the 1905 act, there came from the commission today a ruling that United States bonds, State bonds and other non-taxable bonds are liable to inheritance tax.

The tax is construed to not be on the bonds themselves but upon the transmission through will or other descent. This ruling by the commission is based on a finding by the United States Supreme Court in Plummer vs. Coler, 178, U. S. 115, in which such taxation of United States bonds is admissible as a tax on transmission by will or descent, although the bonds themselves are specifically non-taxable. The commission has received numbers of inquiries as to this question and these effected the ruling just announced.

JIM MCCLURE'S FATE.

Now in the Hands of the State Supreme Court.

JUDGE DANIELS PAYS HIS RESPECTS TO GAMBLING.

In Powerful Charge to Craven Grand Jury

Newbern, N. C., April 7.—In a powerful charge to the Craven grand jury, Judge F. A. Daniels, of Goldsboro, opened a two weeks' term of Craven county Superior court. Whiskey brought to North Carolina from Virginia, combined with the habit of carrying concealed weapons, is responsible for 50 per cent of the crime committed in North Carolina, said Judge Daniels. "Craven county is no worse in this respect than the other counties in the State, neither is it any better. The stuff being made in Virginia and shipped to North Carolina as whiskey, is the vilest kind of poison and it is ruining men crazy. There is nothing more dangerous to a community than a young man tanked up on this mean liquor and with a revolver in his hip pocket."

After dwelling at length on this subject, Judge Daniels went down after the houses of ill-fame and gambling. "The young men frequent these places," said the judge, "and their lives are ruined. As to gambling, it is one of the worst of the many evils. Let a man once become a confirmed gambler and there is nothing but the will of the Almighty that can break him from the habit."

CAUGHT IN THE ACT.

Burglars Have Been Making Trouble At Middlesex.

(Special Star Correspondence.) Wilson, N. C., April 7.—Burglars have made continued trouble in Middlesex, a town on the Norfolk Southern, 20 miles west of Wilson, and for several weeks efforts have been made to catch the offenders. Recently the Norfolk Southern arranged for a watchman to remain in the station all night. Last night three negroes made an effort to effect an entrance.

With no apparent fear of detection, one of them smashed in the front door with an axe. The watchman caught one of them, the others making their escape. Later in the night two negro men made another effort to get in the depot, presumably the same men. They were fired upon but made another get-away.
