Governor Craig Gratified. Governor Craig, in the executive offices today after a week spent campaigning in Western Carolina and in Asheville yesterday to vote, said that he is much gratified at the outcome of the election both in the State and in the Nation, that it is evident that the people have sustained the policy of President Wilson. The measures adopted by a new order and challenged the attention of the whole country and that the next Congress is to be a Democratic one shows that the policy and the measures of the present administration will be sustained and that the reforms he has begun.

The Governor said that he regrets very much that Congressman Guider seems to have lost in the Tenth district and that with the loss of the seat is not a surprise, and that the continued overwhelming Democratic majorities in the State insure the continuation of the enjoyment by the people of the good government with which the State has been blessed since 1900.

Charters Issued. Charters were issued today for three new corporations as follows: The Ashley Home Corporation, Clayton, N. The company has authority to develop farm, timber and city lands, and engage in agriculture generally, operate mills, factories of various sorts and do a general corporate business, organization to be effected November 8th.

Kelly and others, for storage of cotton and issuing negotiable certificates of deposit. The East End Realty Co., of Charlotte, capital \$125,000 authorized and \$5000 subscribed by L. C. Smith, and others, Polkton, and H. H. McLendon, of Wadesboro, for real estate development.

CROSS COUNTRY RUN TO BE MADE SATURDAY. A. & M. College Event of Interest—Other News Notes.

College, will be held Saturday, November 14th. The men making the required run in the A. & M. will be given a gold medal by the athletic association. A number of merchants of Raleigh will give other prizes. Twenty-seven men will constitute the team.

The teams have been arranged with Wake Forest and Trinity, one to be held with each college in Raleigh and one with each college on their respective fields. PRESBYTERIANS ACCEPT GIFT FOR NEW CHURCH

Will Receive \$60,000 If They Raise \$20,000.

Durham, N. C., Nov. 4.—The members of the Presbyterian church decided Sunday to accept the offer of G. W. Watts relative to the building of a new church. The acceptance was unanimous and a vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Watts. Mr. Watts' offer was that he would give \$60,000 toward the building of a new church if the congregation would raise an additional \$20,000. The new church is to cost \$80,000 and will occupy the site of the present house of worship. It was also decided to build a new parsonage for the new church and will occupy a part of the ground on which the parsonage now stands.

Both men and women members of the church had held meetings and had agreed separately to accept the Watts offer and the decision was merely a joint decision of what had already been agreed upon separately. Committees were appointed at the meeting and they will begin at once getting things in a shape for the building of the church. The congregation had already started work before spring, but they intend to have everything in full readiness when warm weather opens up and the work will be pushed to completion.

WILSON NOT PLEASED WITH HER 'COUNTY COURT.' May Ask Legislature to Repeal the Act—Warehouse Completed.

(Special Star Correspondence.) Wilson, N. C., Nov. 4.—Since the establishment of the Recorder's court or the 'county court' as it is usually termed, the result has not been satisfactory to the majority of the citizens, and the board of county commissioners are clearly of the opinion that the next Legislature should be asked to abolish the court. At the last session of the board the matter was discussed and several members of the local bar appeared and asked for another trial of the court. One of the objections to the court is the statement that it is merely an additional expense with very little benefit to the people of the county, as in very few instances are trials in that court finally ended, it being the usual procedure to appeal to the Superior court. The Wilson County Co-operative cotton storage warehouse, erected by the efforts of farmers and town people formerly opened Tuesday. The receipts for the first day went to 150 bales. The management announces storage rates of about half the usual charge and hopes to popularize the warehouse.

At the headquarters of the Fashion Art League of America, in the Michigan Boulevard building, which promulgated the fashion decree, it was declared today that words of approval are coming in from all parts of the United States especially from the North, where the utility of the lingerie underskirt is appreciated these cold days. With the newly fashioned short, wide skirts which women of good taste are adopting, the cotton petticoat comes as the next thing to a necessity. It protects the wearer from cold and exposure.

The popularity of the cotton underskirt will increase the cotton consumption in the United States very materially," said Mme. Alla Ripley, president of the Fashion Art League of America. "You can figure it out for yourself. Each skirt will use up from two to four yards of cotton. The average woman will have from four to six of the skirts in her wardrobe. Now find out how many million women there are in America and you can tell how many billion yards of cotton goods this new fashion decree will add to consumption. Wide skirts are seen with great frequency on Michigan Boulevard daily, where the fashionables of Chicago promenade every afternoon.
