New York, March 9.—Cotton continued irregular today and fluctuations were again irregular with the close steady but at a slight decline in values.

Chicago, March 9.—Assertions that American wheat exports were about twice as rapid as conditions would warrant, sent the market today to a much higher level with the close firm at 3/4 to 5/8 net advance.

New York, March 9.—For the first time since war's outbreak, conditions abroad were today almost wholly subordinated to the stock exchange floor to the Mexican situation.

March notes issued today were estimated at 1,500 bales, but there was practically no trading in March until after midday.
