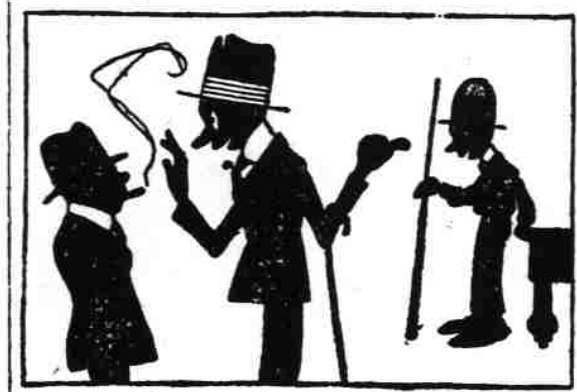
PROCTORVILLE SHUTS OUT FAIR BLUFF AGGREGATION

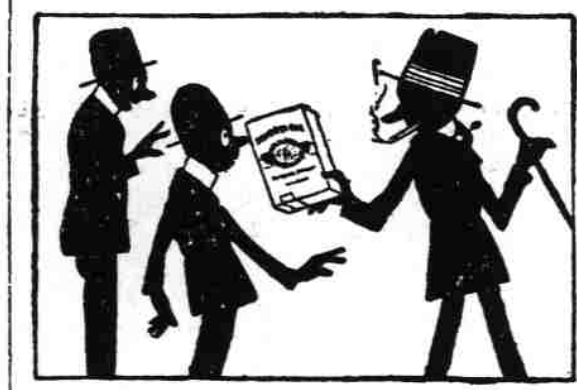
