Boston, Sept. 7.—Philadelphia won both games from Boston today, the first 4 to 2 and the second 2 to 0. In the first game Rixey allowed only one hit up to the seventh inning, when the home team scored their two runs on four singles and an error by Niehoff. Ragan was hit freely and Reulbach was sent in in the ninth. The second game was a pitching duel between Mauer and Hughes up to the sixth inning when Barnes relieved Hughes, who was struck on the back of the right hand with a pitched ball. Philadelphia scored its two runs in the ninth on a single by Luderus after two were down and an error by Smith had filled the bases.

Pittsburg, Sept. 7.—Heavy hitting featured today's game, Pittsburg winning from Chicago 5 to 4. After yielding six hits and three runs, Packard was taken out in the second inning and Franderast, who took his place, also was hit hard. Marnaux was forced from the box in the seventh, Cooper relieving him.

New York, Sept. 7.—New York broke even on a four game series with Brooklyn here today by winning the fourth game 4 to 1. Only 29 Brooklyn men went to bat against Schupp. Wheat hit a home run for Brooklyn's only run in the second. The veteran Rucker also pitched a clever game, errors causing his defeat.

CHARGES PACIFIC COAST LEAGUE AS BEING A TRUST

San Francisco, Sept. 7.—A suit charging that the Pacific Coast League is a trust and that it has conspired to monopolize baseball in California to such an extent that players outside the league are unable to make a living, was filed in the United States district court here today. Mrs. Esther Jacobs, the complainant, seeks to recover \$31,500, three times the amount she claims to have lent the defunct Sacramento club, whose franchise was sold to the Salt Lake City club. The suit is brought under the Sherman anti-trust law.
