PLANNING W. S. S. CAMPAIGN

Complete Census Is Being Made of Wilmington-Meeting of War Savings Workers Held.

A general meeting of W. S. S .workers was held in the campaign headquarters in the federal court room yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock. Those present included the various committee chairmen and vice chairmen, numbering in all about 60. The meeting was called by Chairman J. W. Little to lay before the workers the plans for the preliminary work

for this week, and to hear reports of work of the census taking.

Mr. Mason and Mr. Struthers both reported progress in the taking of the census and the completionof their organizations. It was decided to make every effort possible to complete the census by Monday night as it will require the remainder of the week to

prepare the cards and complete the necessary clerical work preliminary to the campaign. Block captains are requested to return the cards not later than Monday night. The co-operation of the public is asked in the taking of this census and give all the aid possible to the workers. The taking of the census has been worked out in a systematic method by the campaign secretary, Miss Margaret Gibson, and when completed will be a valuable piece of work.

During the present week it was decided to hold war savings rallies in the city and surrounding townships to inform the people of the coming campaign and of what is expected of them. The chairmen in the different precincts have the arrangements of these rallies in charge and already some of the dates and places have been decided upon

Meetings will be held at South Wilmington school Tuesday night, Winter Park Thursday night, and Corne-

lius Harnett school Tuesday night. Mrs. J. M. Solky, chairman of the speakers' committee, has charge of procuring speakers for these rallies which are to be held in every precinct in the county, during the next week. Chairman Little emphasized the necessity of the early completion of the census so that the work of the campaign can be carried on efficiently.
