BRITISH LABOR PARTY WILL BREAK POLITICAL WAB-TRUCE

London, June 27 .- The British labor party at its conference held here toay adopted a resolution to the effect that the party political truce which has been in effect in Great Britain since early in the war should no longer

be recognized. George Nicoll Barnes, labor memer of parliament for the Blackfriars division of Glasgow, and member of he war cabinet, said after the coneernce that he was surprised at the large vote cast against the continuace of the political truce. He said he was unable to say as yet what action the labor members would take but that something must happen.

K. of C. Men Arrive Safely. New York, June 27 .- Dr. E. W. Buckley, supreme physician; James J. McGraw, supreme director, and Lawrence O'Murray, deputy overseas commissioner of the Knights of Columbus, have arrived in France to supervise a large expansion of the organization's war activities necessitated by the rapidly increasing number of American troops abroad.
