New York, June 27 .- Bearish private ed to further reactions in the cotor 27 points net lower. That delivery 1.49%. closed at 25.14 with the general list closing steady at a net decline of 10

The market showed steadiness at the start on covering and trade buying of early new crop months. The opening was steady at an advance of 10 to 20 points and after some little trregularity active months sold 12 to 20 points higher. Offerings increased at his level and the market turned easier after the publication of the western helt forecast for cloudy weather in Oklahoma and east Texas and showers Arkansas.

Detailed reports of the weather bureau showed light rains or showers at three stations in central Texas which had been complaining of drouth. The break extended to 27.75 for July and 24.38 for December, making net declines of 25 to 27 points, but there was good trade buying on the basis of 23 cents for October and on a scale down from that level which absorbed the contracts and led to the final rally.


