Four stocks contributed almost onethird of today's output-U. S. Steel, Marine pfd., Mexican Petroleum and Southern Pacific leading more or less in the order named.

Steel started off at a moderately strong pace, but replaced its extreme advance of 1 1-4 points with a net fractional loss. Marine substituted a slight early gain with a substantial setback of two points, Mexican Petroleum reversed its initial advance of 1 1-2 with an extreme setback of 9 points and Southern Pacific forfeited nearly all of its gain of a point. These movements were typical of
