INHERITANCE TAX SWELLS TREASURY

Corporation Commission Turns Over \$91,000 More.

Makes Total of \$374,000 Collected In The State During The Past Year -Other News Of The Capital City.

Raleigh, Dec. 2.-The corporation commission turned over to the state reasurer today \$91.000, balance of inheritance taxes collected the past fiseal year by the commission under the law passed by the legislature two, years ago giving the commission this work. The payment of this sum into the state treasury rounds up a total of \$374,000-total inheritance tax collections by the commission the past year. This is in comparison with less than \$50,000 which was collected for the year just prior to the delegation of this tax collection to the commission.

Members of the commission say that they are confident that the inheritance tax revenue for the state the next year will be fully \$1,000,000. The taxes the past year came from every quarter of the state with the tax against the Cone estate, Greensboro, constituting lecidely the biggest lump sum. It is believed that with some readjustments of the inheritance tax laws by the legislature soon to meet it will be possible to run up this source of state revenue to a very considerable sum. It is a notable fact that the Kentucky newspapers are boasting that the state can easily pay off its entire indebtedness with the inheritance tax revenue on the estate of Mrs. R. W. Bingham, who was Miss Kenan, of Wilmington.

PROTECT BOND HOLDERS Treasury Has Scheme For Detecting Liberty Bond Frauds. Washington, Dec, 2 .- A' method of estricting fraudulent or highly speculative stock promoting schemes involving the trading of these securities

for liberty bonds has been devised by the treasury, and may be put into effect soon to protect the millions of liberty bond owners against loss.

In effect, the treasury's plan would be a sort of national "blue sky" operation by which promoters would find their businesses subject to close scrutiy of the government. These found suspicious or of actual fraudulent nature might be barred from accepting liberty bonds in payment for their securities, through the government's refusal to grant them operat-

ing licenses. The authority for this plan is given in the provision in the fourth liberty loan act empowering the president to "investigate and regulate by means of licenses or otherwise" transactions in liberty bonds or certificates .of indebtedness for two years after the proclamation of peace.

The law was based on the belief that after the war hundreds of promotion schemes, would spring up to offer stocks and bonds for development projects in exchange for liberty bonds.

Germany's Age-Long Dream To Have One On Rhine Delayed.

The Hague, Dec. 2 .- Germany's agelong dream of obtaining a direct water route from the Rhine to the North Sea may be still further delayed by de-Instead of sending her ships feat. through Rotterdam and Antwerp, her latest project is to construct a waterway from Wiesdorf, on the Rhine, near Cologne, to Emden, at the mouth of the Ems on the North Sea. It would have a depth of about 30 feet, so as to allow the passage of vessels of fairly large draft, and a length of 120 miles, and would cost around \$75,000,-000.

cooperation on the part of the whole REMOVE RESTRICTIONS ON INTERIOR COTTON SHIPMENTS Washington, Dec. 2 .- Restrictions on the shipment of cotton from interior points for eport wilxl be removed by an order to be issued tomorrow by the railroad administration, Senator Mc-Kellar of Tennessee, announced tonight after a conference with Director Chambers of the railroad administration's division of traffic. Removal of the restrictions, Senator McKellar said, will permit direct ship ment from interior points in the south of cotton to all allied and neutral countries except the neutrals contiguous to Germany and Austria. Heretofore bills of lading for shipments were limited to the seaboard.




