On the whole, however, offerings were soon absorbed and the market turned firmer r somewhat more encouraging reports from the goods trade and talk of small rop figures from the government next Part of the buying was atributed to covering contracts sold for January, March and May delivery by Wall street and western interests before the signing of the armistice. Afer this demand had been supplied the market sagged a few points but firmed up again in the late trading on trade buying and a scattering demand from mmission house sources, followed by reports that the British freight room allotment for January would be for 300.000 bales, or about 50,000 bales, in excess of the revised allotment for Deember. December contracts sold at 17.85 and March at 25.65.
