## COTTON TURNS FIRM CORN PRICES HIGHER STOCKS AGAIN SLUMP

### High Prices of the Day Made in the Late Trading, Closing 27 to 65 Points Up.

New York, Dec. 20.—Early reactions were followed by renewed firmness in the cotton market today and prices made new high ground for the movement in the late trading. January contracts sold up from 27.77 to 28.45, while December contracts touched the market at a new level of 27.45. The close was firm at 28.44 for January and at a net advance of 27 to 65 points. The census report showing 10,252,467 bales of cotton ginned prior to December 13, compared with 10,131,384 bales last year, was slightly over expectations and may have promoted realizing during the early trading. The opening was irregular at an advance of 27 points to a decline of 1 point. Firmness held late night's closing figures but later months eased off after the call with March reacting to 28.88 and with the more active derivatives selling some 15 to 20 points lower. Trade buying was rather slow with this setback, however, and the market soon firmed up on covering by early sellers which seemed to be stimulated by the more favorable view of the goods situation, continued bullish spot market reports and reports that southern shippers were finding it difficult to secure the spot cotton grades wanted to fill their contracts in the South.

Prices reached the highest levels of the day in the late trading with March selling at 27.24 and closing at 27.18. A plus correction of 72,000 bales was reported in the season's exports which probably served to emphasize the talk of an increasing outward movement and reports were received from Galveston that 20 steamers were expected there for cotton during the next two weeks.

Chicago, Dec. 20.—Notable strength in the corn market resulted today largely from widespread rains which threatened further serious hindrance to the crop movement. Prices, although unsettled at the finish, were 1/4 to 5/8 net higher with January 1.33 1/2 to 1.39 1/2 and May 1 3/4 to 1.38 1/2.

### BRADSTREET'S TRADE REVIEW.

New York, Dec. 20.—Bradstreet's tomorrow will say: "An animation flowing from holiday buying sharply contrasts with slow movements evidenced in wholesale lines, with the effects of cancellations, with downward revisions of some prices and with uncertainty seated either on the divergent views as to the future expressed by prominent personages or by concerns over the fact that the government has large supplies of unused materials to market. Inventorying is under way, traveling salesmen are in for the holidays, small lot filling orders conveyed by mail are the rule, and in cases where unexpectedly large stocks have been revealed, the policy is to clear decks. In fact, the general attitude is toward manufacturers' goods, the products in order to hasten readjustments and make a market.  
 "Auction sales of wool conducted by the government have disclosed a strong demand and good prices for desirable materials, but low-grade stuff seemed to go begging for takers, and offerings of woolsens similarly made brought satisfactory prices for men's material while showing weakness in women's goods, the products going to jobbers rather than to manufacturers.

### Yesterday's Market Recorded Fifth Successive Set-Back of the Week—Liberty Bonds OK.

New York, Dec. 20.—Stocks recorded their fifth successive set-back of the week today, declines being resumed after an irregular opening in which a few leaders showed temporary strength, probably on short covering. The additional liquidation and bearish aggression were attributed to increasing signs of dissatisfaction more particularly as affecting the railroads and general industries. This was exemplified by Mr. McAdoo's attitude towards the transportation and reports of fresh cancellations of war contracts and cuts in commodity prices.  
 Yet another reason was provided by the renewed request of the treasury department for an indefinite continuance of restricted money conditions, although call funds were in freer supply at as low as 3 1/2 per cent.  
 Renewal of heavy selling of liberty bonds, on a scale approximating yesterday's enormous turnover with the fourth 1/4's at the new low mark of 94.50 was not calculated to allay apprehension, the first 4's incidentally making a new minimum for the year at 92.  
 The one encouraging note was sounded by the sale to a banking syndicate of \$50,000,000 Pennsylvania railroad 5 per cent bonds and the largely absorption of that issue at a large over-subscription. That is the large financial undertaking by private bankers since the close of the war and bespeaks a sound investment situation.  
 Rails, shippings, utilities and copper were the chief elements of heaviness, though rallying quite substantially towards the close. Oils, tobacco and a few specialties were relatively firm.  
 Convertible railroad bonds and traction stocks eased one to 2 points but international wires were steady and active. Total sales, par value \$20,400,000. Old U. S. bonds unchanged on call.

Lieutenant Moore was originally attached to the Shelby truck company but was later transferred to Battery D, composed of Anson and Union counties. He obtained his training at Camp Woodhouse, Texas. He is about 28 years old.

Washington, Dec. 20.—Information that Baron Sakatani, one of the leading financiers of Japan, has been appointed financial adviser to the Chinese government, was received at the state department today from Ambassador Morris at Tokio. Baron Sakatani, in accepting the appointment, has been said to have given a statement to the newspapers saying he intends to effect a currency reform by adoption of the gold standard, with an ultimate view to better trade relations between Japan and China.
