WILSON RECEIVES DOCTOR'S DEGREE

First Ever Conferred By University of Paris.

Is Given in Recognition of the President's Work as a Jurist and Historian—Vice Rector Pays Glowing Tribute.

Paris, Dec. 21.—(Havas)—In the great amphitheatre of the University of Paris (the Sorbonne), President Wilson this afternoon received the degree of doctor, Honoris Causa, conferred upon him in recognition of his work as a jurist and historian...

President Poincare, the presidents of the senate and chamber of deputies and diplomatic corps, government and civil and military authorities attended. Great crowds cheered the president when he arrived accompanied by Mrs. Wilson, American Ambassador Sharp and Jules Jusserand, French ambassador to the United States.

Alfred Coize, dean of the faculty of letters, welcomed President Wilson in a short address and presented to him the diploma of doctor as a testimonial to his work as an historian and his writings on historical subjects...
