LIPTON'S CHALLENGER

TRIED UNDER OWN SAIL.

City Island, N. Y., June 1.—Sir Thomas Lipton's yacht, Shamrock IV, challenger for the America's cup, was tried under her own sail today for the first time since being brought to this country in 1914. In a breeze of about ten knots, the reconstructed green racer was put through her paces on Long Island sound. In the aggregate she had about a twenty mile spin. Crossing the sound to Hempstead Harbor and then back towards Larchmont.

Captain Wm. Burton who will sail the Shamrock IV, was at the wheel. There also was on board Mrs. Burton, wife of the English skipper; Col. Duncan Neill, Sir Thomas Lipton's yachting representative in America and Charles Nicholson, designer of the craft. At the end of the trip, all stated they were pleased with the way the yacht stood up in a breeze that was decidedly stronger than the one that carried away the Resolute's mast off New Haven a week ago Saturday.

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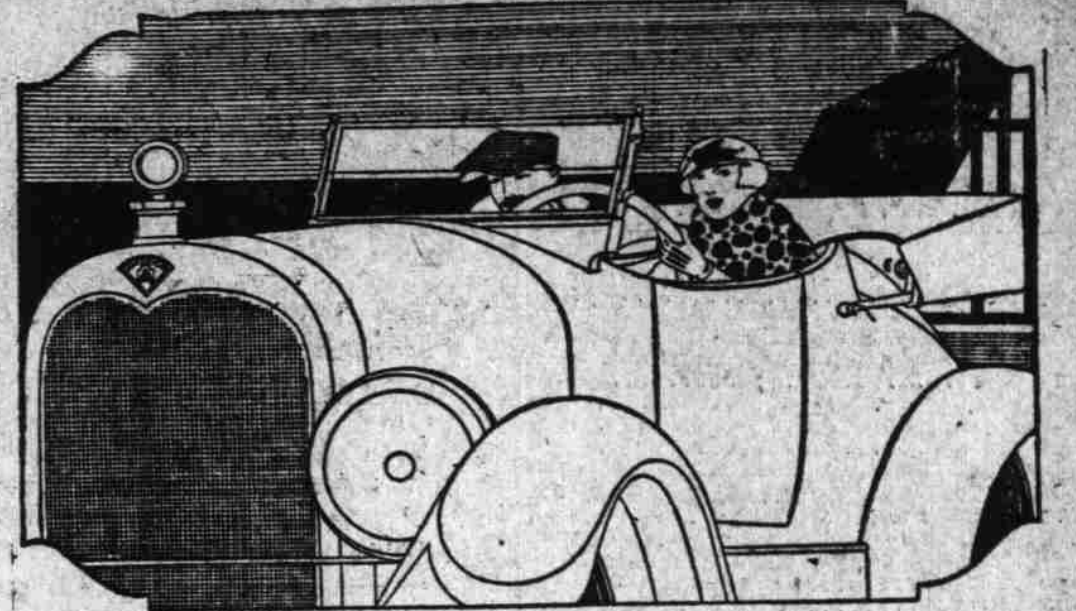

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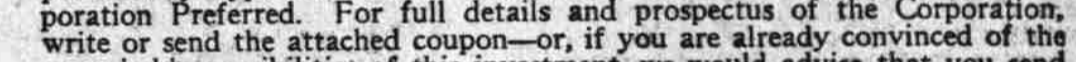
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
