## Kilonis Now In Fine Shape

Turner Will Meet A Veritable Whirlwind When He Encounters Durable Demon Greek Tuesday.

"Fighting John" Kilonis is geared high for his Tuesday night finish match with Turner, middleweight title holder, at the Academy of Music and fans are confidently expecting the classic of the season. Four days spent on Wrightsville Beach has put old John in tip-top shape and the mighty Turner will meet a veritable whirlwind on Tuesday night when he wrestles and aggressively John charges.

Fans have this to ponder over between the present and tomorrow night when Turner will defend his title. Joe has never lost a match in Wilmington and has appeared here on numerous occasions—this season and in the past—has always been returned winner.

Three years ago when Kilonis was here Hanson found little difficulty in mastering the Greek demon. But this morning told a different tale. Kilonis took the Swede into camp here and he repeated the trick in Charleston, winning two out of three matches from the Swede. Pink Gardner got three out of four matches from Fritz which proved his superiority beyond the shadow of a doubt and then Kilonis secured a clean cut victory over Gardner in the roughest, most spectacular and most remarkable bout ever staged in Wilmington.

This victory entitled Kilonis to his crack at Turner and the fighting Greek boy had the nerve and audacity to tell the crowd after vanquishing Gardner that he had not been rough—that the real rough stuff would come on Tuesday night when he clashed with Turner.

Kilonis must be regarded as one of the foremost middleweights in the country and his clash with Turner should offer the best fight of the season locally. Excepting Walter Kotonen, Kilonis is the most formidable man in the country and fans are eager for the fray.

Columbia, S. C., June 6.—The feat of Pitcher Jesse Doyle, of Greenville, in winning his thirteenth straight game of the season when he defeated Charleston in the second game of a double header was a feature of the week's play in the South Atlantic association. This is believed to give Doyle the record for the South Atlantic circuit as it surpasses the mark made by Pitcher Muriel Spaid when he won twelve straight games for Columbia in 1915. Spaid, who joined Columbia in mid-season, lost his first game, won twelve and lost his last game of the season.

Columbia continues to lead the league with an advantage of two games over Greenville, in second place. Spartanburg is third with Charleston and Charlotte tied for fourth, and fifth places. Augusta, although still last, gained ground during the week, turning in four victories and only two defeats. Manager Stark rejoined his team Monday after a scouting trip that netted a number of new players who have strengthened his club.

Columbia during the week won three games and lost two, as did Spartanburg. Greenville was able to win only three while losing four, Charlotte having the same record. Charleston won two and lost four.

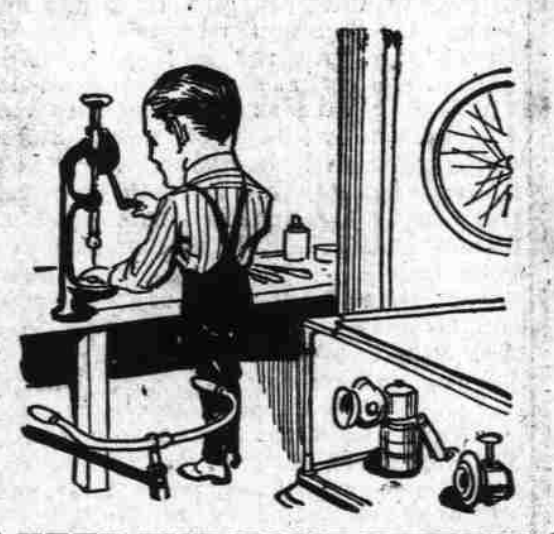
