# **COMMISSION TO ACT ON STATE BUDGET**

Meeting to Consider Estimates Will Be Held Soon After November 10

#### (Special to The Star)

RALEIGH, Oct. 26 .- The budget commission will meet here soon after November 10 for the purpose of going

over the estimates of expenses of the various state departments for the coming year in order that it may prepare a tentative budget for the 1921 session of the legislature. The budget commission, composed of the governor, a representative of the tax commission and a committee from the legislature representing the finance and appropriations committees, will go over the department estimates and work them into some semblance of conformity with the estimated revenues of the state for the coming two years.

Each state department, institution and office has been asked by the commission to submit a budget of its proposed expenditures for the coming two years. Forms have been prepared and the blanks sent to all departments and institutions. They are asked to fill out these blanks and return them to Ral-

eigh not later than November 10. 'The request for this information, of course, does not carry with it the promise that all the demands for revenue will be met in full. ,The commission will go over the various tentative budgets, consider the program of work for the coming year and look into the needs of the various departments and institutions.

Legislature Acts Finally

Ultimate decision as to whether or not any one department will get all the money it asks for will be up to the legislature, of course, but the work of the budget commission will greatly facilitate the duties of the finance and appropriations committees of the legislature. The legislature is expected to follow the suggestion of the budget commission very largely, though it is possible that, in some instances, the recommendations of the commission

may be overruled. The budget commission is a product of the last session of the legislature



On November 2 an amendment to the Constitution of North Carolina will be sub. mitted to the people for ratification or rejection.

This amendment radically affects the fundamental subject of taxation.

Every voter, ng matter which party he supports, should give serious attention tr this matter. Political officers come and go. but the constitution and taxes go on for. ever.


It proposes to put a tax on incomes derived from property already taxed on its value. The exemption is \$1,000 for unmar. ried people; \$2,000 for heads of families.

That is, it empowers the legislature to impose a tax of 6 per cent on-

### LAZY ARTESIAN WELLS IN NEED OF DEEPENING

Water Supply

(Special to The Star) KINSTON, N. C., Oct. 26 .- The scores of artesian wells which gush up all over this town will have to be deepended about 200 feet, according to notice served on the community by "Dynamite" Wilkins, expert on such things and the explosive from which he many years ago took the nickname by which he is known throughout this part of the country.

The municipal pumping station is on lower ground than the rest of the city. New wells sunk there are robbing the overflow wells, Wilkins declares, and the latter will have to be bored to a lower level. At the level to which he proposes to bore there is enough "pure, mineral water" to supply "a town like Baltimpre," he states, and it will be a comparatively simple matter to tap that supply.

Dozens of fountains and pipes bringing the water from 350 feet down are beginning to "get lazy" or cease flowing. The water pumped into Kinston homes or running free that all may drink has well-known mineral properties

"Dynamite" Wilkins, who some years ago, drew the interest of noted geolbringing water from the beaches of east Carolina where no fresh water was thought to exist, asserts that the local supply is of idenquality with that at Seven tical Springs, which merits greater exploitation, he declares, than has been accorded it in the past. Artesian wells flow along the roadsides and on the farms all around the city, and the crystal clear liquid they give forth is recognized officially as the "principal asset" of the community.



Put a tax on rents. for example. The landlord may appear to pay it, but he will load it on the tenant. He will increase the rent.

The ultimate consumer will bear the burden.

Having valued real estate and personal property for taxation at the top-notch, this amendment will authorize the legislature to further tax it by taxing rents and profits thereof.

It does not limit the rate of taxation, except for strictly state and county purposes. It does not limit taxation for roads or schools. Read the amendment and you will see that the way is provided to break over the limit at will for these purposes. It does tremendously extend the power of the legislature to take taxes on incomes. This is its purpose.

If this amendment is adopted the outside
