N. AND W. HEARING TO BE COMPLETED TODAY Rules for Yardmen and Filling Switchmen's Jobs Discussed

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—Requests for rules covering yardmen riding on cars and providing for filling switch tenders' jobs with disabled yardmen, were the principal points brought up at the afternoon session of the Norfolk and Western railroad hearing before the United States railway labor board today.

The rule regarding yardmen riding on cars in "hump" yards was requested as a safety measure. Road officials, however, said that there had been few accidents, and that they did not consider rules as necessary. The brotherhood's submission of a rule to fill all yard vacancies with promotable men and to employ up to 25 per cent of brotherhood men brought on considerable argument from both sides.

The rule was asked to prevent discrimination against white trainmen, brotherhood officials said. The railroad contended its right to employ whomsoever it chose. An attempt to support the rule was made by the association of colored railroad trainmen, but the board ruled not to admit testimonies of the association's representatives.

The case of yardmen, called and not used, similar to that taken up yesterday in the case of trainmen, also came up. The session is expected to be completed tomorrow.

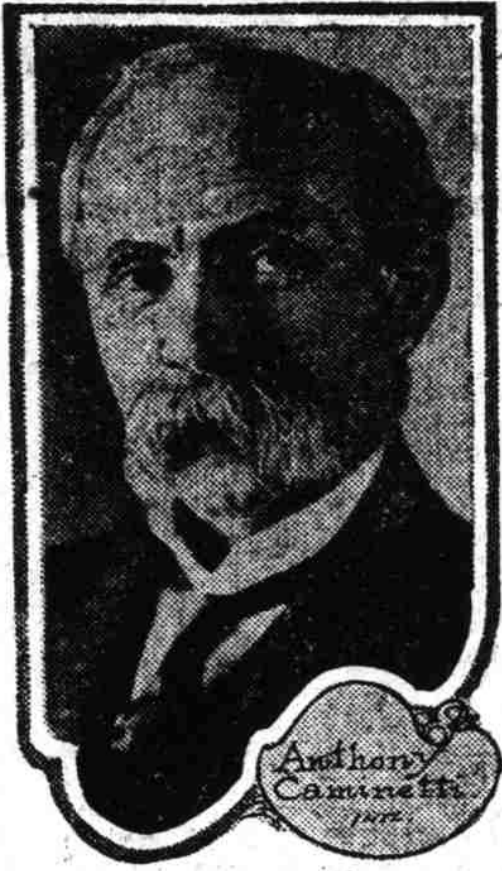
TWO SMALL FIRES The fire department responded to two alarms last night, but in both cases the damage was slight.

CALIFORNIA SENATORS DISCUSS JAP AFFAIRS

Johnson and Phelan Standing Pat on Anti-Alien Enactment

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Japanese objections to racial discrimination in this country would not be met, Senator Phelan, Democrat, California, said today, by the enactment of a general anti-alien land ownership bill in California as a substitute for the anti-alien bill adopted by referendum in the state last November and affecting particularly Japanese nationals, by its clause prohibiting ownership of land by aliens ineligible to citizenship.

Japanese officials, Senator Phelan said he was informed, contend that a general anti-alien land ownership law in California would not meet the question of race discrimination and that so long as there are citizenship disqualifications for Japanese and not for other aliens, such discrimination will exist.

He added that he expected a request would be made of the United States by Japan for a federal law to naturalize present Japanese residents of this country, and declared it would be resisted to the utmost.

At the same time Senator Johnson, Republican, California, expressed a disposition to stand on the anti-alien law enacted in November and to oppose considering a general anti-alien bill which, he added, would only complicate unnecessarily the situation. The present law, he said, was "strictly within the rights of California" and could not properly give offense to the Japanese.

WILL BEGIN HEARINGS FORDNEY TARIFF BILL

Senate Finance Committee in Stormy Session Sets Thursday as the Date

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Stumbling blocks which the Fordney emergency tariff bill has encountered since reaching the senate committee today to rise up in its pathway. The chief of these appeared in the decision of the senate finance committee in a stormy executive session to hold hearings on the measure.

Advocates of the tariff measure believed its champions had hoped the committee's action would mean the death of the bill. Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah, was understood to have told the committee the move would cause the bill either to be killed in conference or "flustered to death on the senate floor." The projected hearings will begin Thursday and continue until next Tuesday and will be followed, also by decision of the committee today, by hearings on the soldier compensation bill.

The finance committee meeting today was the first over which Senator Fordney, its chairman, presided in more than 13 months. An attempt by Senator Simmons, Democrat, North Carolina, to postpone action indefinitely on the tariff bill developed the first clash. The motion lost, however, by two Democrats, Senators Nye and Jones of Idaho and Jones of New Mexico, joining the Republicans.

The question of holding open hearings, committee members reported, brought on a second vote and exchanges in which "sharp words" were used. The motion to open the hearings was made by Senator Gerry, Democrat, Rhode Island, and it was given the support of all the Democratic members in addition to Chairman Penrose, who was joined by another Republican, Calder, of New York.

Senator Penrose after the meeting issued a statement in which he said that both the soldier bonus and tariff measures, "undoubtedly would be reported to the senate." He declined, however, to offer a prediction as to what action would be taken in the senate.
