## KINSTON HAS REAL WINTER

(Special to The Star) KINSTON, Jan. 28 .- Two or three hundred feet of corrugated iron and frame sheds are down in various parts of this city, having collapsed under the weight of tons of snow piled up during a 15-hour precipitation. Approximately 100 feet gave way at Queen and Shine streets. Presbyterians had narrow escapes when a heavy metal shed fell at Queen and North. Other sheds before stores in southeastern Kinston and elsewhere collapsed. The streets are a foot deep in water at places, the sewerage system incapable of carrying off the floating ice and thawing snow. A cord of wood or stone contains 128 cubic feet.
