IMPORTANT PART PLAYED BY JAPANESE IN HAWAII
HONOLULU, T. H., Jan. 5.—(Correspondence Associated Press).—That the Japanese in Hawaii are indispensable to the production of the territory's natural wealth and that they should realize the gravity of their responsibility toward the community in which they live, was part of the new year's message given to the Japanese colony on the islands by Japanese consul-general, C. Yada, as reported in the columns of the Japanese daily, Nippu Jiji. The consul-general said, according to the Nippu Jiji: "Japanese in Hawaii, through long years of residence, have come to play an important role in the development of these islands and the fact that they have become an indispensable element in the production of Hawaii's wealth should make them realize all the more the gravity of their responsibility toward the community in which they live. To get along harmoniously and co-operatively with the rest of the people in the community they must discharge their duties."
