AMERICANS IN RHINE COUNTRY RESTRAINING THE EXTREMISTS

COBLENZ, April 30.—America's representation on the interallied Rhineland commission, while described as unofficial, wields as much influence in a consultative capacity on decisions taken by the commission as that of the three allied countries officially represented, according to Mr. Roly-Jacquemys, Belgian high commissioner on the Rhine.

General Allen, acting in his dual capacity of commander of the American forces in Germany and representative of the department of state, attends every sitting of the commission or, when unable to be present, is represented by Colonel Stone of Mississippi. No decisions are taken without having been first submitted to the American representatives and in many cases American suggestions have been acted upon and have caused agreements to be reached when it seemed as if a hopeless deadlock was to be feared.

Lately when the question of the application of the new customs regime in the occupied zone, decided upon at the London conference on March 3 was discussed, the British and the French points of view were very far apart. After a few days' discussion, General Allen's opinion was asked.

The discussion had been somewhat acrimonious and General Allen, while

not indorsing unreservedly either point of view, proposed a medium solution. To the French who are advocating the sternest measures, he said: "You can't get both steak and milk from the same cow."

To the British he demonstrated that better results might be obtained by adopting another course and after a few hours discussion upon details of execution, the commission drafted its report which was sent to the council of ambassadors the next day.

The American's view point upon a momentous question of penalties was adopted.

It is the consensus of opinion among delegations to the Rhineland commission that America's participation in the deliberations of the commission has had a restraining influence upon extremists in both French and German camps.

WORLD COMMERCE CHAMBER MEETS IN LONDON JUNE 27

PARIS, April 30.—Arrangements for the London congress of the international chamber of commerce to begin Monday, June 27, have just been made by the board of directors at a meeting here.

Delegates to the congress will be organized in five groups. Walter D. Hines, formerly United States director-general of railroads, will be chairman of the group for transportation and

communications, while the chairman of the other four groups will be Dr. Walter Leaf, Great Britain, for finance; Eugene Schneider, France, for production; Marco Cassin, Italy, for distribution; and Lucien Beckers, Belgium, for devastated regions.

The American representatives on group committees will probably be: Finance, Thomas W. Lamont of J. P. Morgan and company, New York; production, E. G. Miner, president of the Pfaudler company, Rochester, N. Y.; and distribution, Gerard Swope, president of the International General Electric company, N. Y.

In addition a committee has been appointed to sit during the congress to deal with questions relating to the organization and operations of the international chamber on which the American representative will be John H. Fahey, of Boston. The representative of the United States on the committee which will consider resolutions to be placed before the general meeting will be Joseph G. Defrees, president of the United States chamber of commerce.

The board approved nearly 300 applications for membership. These included recognized organizations in various countries and 128 firms or individuals who were admitted as associate members.
