

Giants Win National Pennant; Cleveland Is Blanked; Yankees Win

White Sox Shut Out the Indians While Yanks Win

Cleveland Virtually Eliminated From American Pennant Race and Must Win Remaining Three Games and Yankees Lose Three, If the Latter Are to Be Beaten to the Pole—Red Sox Beat Senators

Sept. 29.—Chicago virtually eliminated Cleveland from the American pennant race today by shutting out the Indians, 5 to 0. Kerr pitched a masterly game, holding Cleveland to 8 hits, while the Sox fell on Sothoron and Caldwell for ten hits.

Cleveland, to beat out New York in the struggle for the flag, must win its three remaining games, and the Yankees lose their remaining three. The margin between the pennant contenders tonight was two and a half games.

Kerr celebrated a day set aside in his honor by not allowing a Cleveland player to pass second. The Indians threatened in the fourth, but Kerr started a double play which shattered their hopes.

After the Sox scored two runs in the first Cleveland played a listless game. In the first Johnson led off with a single and took second on Strunk's out. After Collins had tied off Evans, Hooper drove a single to center, scoring Johnson. Hooper taking second on this throw to the plate. Shely followed with another single over second, scoring Hooper.

With runners on first and second in the second inning, and two out, Manager Speaker sent Stephenson to bat for pitcher Sothoron. Caldwell assumed the pitching burden in the second and zared well until the sixth when, after two were out, Chicago scored another run. GIANTS, THOUGH IDLE, WINNERS OF PENNANT
Yankees Virtually Certain of Victory

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—The New York Giants, though idle today, won the National league pennant race by virtue of Pittsburgh's double defeat by the St. Louis Cardinals.

The Giants now are four and one-half games in the lead. They have four games left to play, while Pittsburgh has three. If the Giants were to lose all 4 and Pittsburgh win all three, the Giants still would be a game ahead.

The New York Americans virtually are certain to be the Giants' opponents in the world series. Winning today while Cleveland was losing, the Yankees can now lose by dropping three straight games while the Indians are winning three.

New York has two more games to play with Philadelphia and one with Boston, while Cleveland has three more with Chicago.

As the Yankees have a postponed game with Washington which will not be played off, it will be possible for the New York team to finish the race on even terms with Cleveland in games won but capture the pennant by having one less defeat. This will happen if the Yankees win one of their three games and the Indians take three straight.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 29.—By defeating Philadelphia today 5 to 0 New York tightened its hold upon the American league lead. As Cleveland was beaten today by Chicago, the Yankees need but one more victory to clinch the pennant.
