

Railroad Revenues Larger in November Than Same Month 1921

LONDON FOGS GREATLY INCREASE MORTALITY RATES

LONDON, Jan. 1 .- The recent fogs which have prevailed in and around London are responsible not only for greatly increased expenditure for lighting, but have caused more than the usual amount of sickness and suffering to the population.

This is set forth by medical experts who quote statistics to show that for the week ended November 25 the death rate in London was 14.3 per 1,000 against a death rate for the whole of England and Wales of 12.6 per 1,000. Deaths from bronchitis and bronchopneumonia rose to 288 from the previous weeks figure of 182. This rise, which is principally among children, is ascribed to weather conditions, to the darkness and irritation of the Londen fogs.
