WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—December postal receipts in 50 selected cities were the largest in the history of the service, with a collection of \$29,150,025.33, it was reported today by the postoffice department. They present a gain of \$2,422,749.65 or 8.66 per cent. over December 1921, despite a handicap of five Sundays last December.

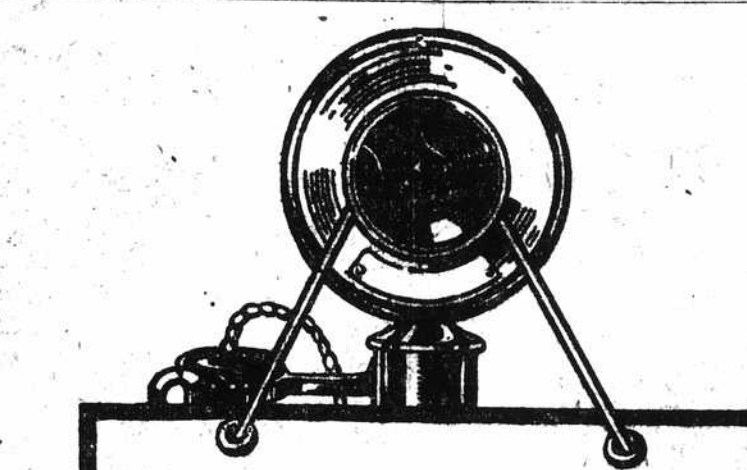

300 Women Register For Industrial Meet

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Credentials to nearly 300 women delegates from 35 states have been issued by the woman's bureau of the department of labor for the women's industrial conference, which will open a three-day session next Thursday. The list includes state labor officials, women experts on industrial questions and industrial 50 national organizations of women active in business, industrial, professional and civic affairs. "What women workers mean to industry and what industry means to women workers" will be the subject for the first day's sessions at which Secretary of Labor Davis will be the principal speaker. "Health standards for women in industry," "home work" and "women's wages" will form the program for discussion on Friday and the meeting will close Saturday afternoon.

Eruption of Volcano Removes Mountain Top

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Jan. 7.—(By The Associated Press)—The top of Pavlov mountain, Aleutian peninsula, has been blown off by a volcanic eruption, according to wireless messages received here, which said the volcano had become active, lighting up the sky for many miles with the glow from the crater, reflected by snow-topped peaks. The severe earthquake fell in this section December 30, is believed to have resulted from the activity of this volcano.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON REVIEW NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 7.—During a good part of this last week the price of cotton contracts hovered around the high levels yet reached this season, although no new high records for the season were established, except on October, which traded up to 24.65 cents a pound. March, the most active, at its crop position, traded up to 26.75 at its peak. The week closed with prices five points down to ten points up, compared with the close of the preceding week. At the highest levels, prices were 35 to 44 points over the closing quotations of last week while at their lowest they were 27 to 38 points under. Fluctuations were within a range of 58 to 80 points. March closed at 26.31. In the spot department, middling gained 38 points in the net result, closing at 26.88, the highest price yet reached this season by spot at 17.25. Trade conditions on this side of the water, with a resulting strong spot demand, were mainly responsible for the steadiness of the week. Mill and cotton goods centers continued to report a large trade at advancing prices, the situation among the mills being best was reported by spinners talking of cotton, which Hester counted at 361,000 bales of the week against 324,000 this week last year and 302,000 this week. The grand total of the grand total of two years ago. Of spinners took 209,000 bales divided between 140,000 bales by southern mills and 69,000 by the northern group.

Towards the end of the week considerable liquidation of long contracts was induced by the unfavorable state of affairs politically abroad and this coming week politics can hardly fall to have considerable effect on sentiment, one way or the other. Owing to the observance on Monday of the anniversary of the battle of New Orleans the week in this market will not open until Tuesday. On the opening of that day's session the census bureau will issue its eighth report of the season on spinning and its figures may determine the character of the trading of at least the early part of the opening day of the new week.

New Engine is Being Developed For Planes

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—An airplane engine which will run on ordinary fuel oil instead of gasoline is being developed by the national advisory committee for aeronautics, it was disclosed today when testimony recently given before a house appropriations subcommittee by Dr. Charles T. Walcott, chairman of advisory committee, was made public. "We are confident," he said, "that in comparatively short time, maybe a year or may be two years, we shall have fully equipped an engine which will be entirely free from all those objections which the gasoline engine now has." The new engine, Dr. Walcott said, would be lighter and cheaper and would eliminate the fire hazard.

Appeal is Made For Passage of Bursum Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—Congress has been asked by the American Legion to take action before March 4 on the Bursum bill, providing for the retirement of disabled emergency army officers. The appeal for passage of this measure was contained in a letter addressed to each member of the house by John T. Taylor, vice-chairman of the legion's legislative committee which was made public here today. The letter said the disabled emergency officer "has been left in the cold," and charged that failure of congress to act on the measure, which has been awaiting final action for more than three years, was "a shameful example of the inability of congress to function."
