Man Who Mysteriously Disappeared Shows up

Miffin Holton, of Pamlico, Gives no Explanation

NEW BERN, Jan. 9.—Miffin Holton, Olympia white man, who dropped out of sight mysteriously last summer, has returned to his wife and family here today, according to a report reaching here to- day, and as mysteriously as he depart- ed. Holton himself refuses to discuss his sojourn and members of his family, if they know anything, are keeping it under cover.

Holton, who owned his farm near Olympia, five miles north of here, work- ed in a local barber shop on Saturdays. One Saturday afternoon last summer he left his work, presumably to do some shopping, and never came back. When last seen he was on a Norfolk Southern train en route to Goldsboro. For weeks afterwards Mrs. Holton sought in vain for her husband through correspondence with police depart- ments in this and adjoining states, and newspapers carried notices, but not one word was heard from the missing man. A night or so ago he appeared at his home, apparently none the worse for his six months of self-imposed exile, but as silent as the proverbial clam.

Fuller Introduces Sub For Bursum Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Chairman Fuller of the house pension committee, introduced today a pension bill similar to the Bursum bill, which was vetoed by President Harding last week, but with some of the features cited as ob- jectionable by the president omitted. The Fuller bill would increase the compensation of civil war veterans, en- titled to pensions under existing law, to \$72 a month, and of widows of vet- erans to \$50 a month. Unlike the Bur- sum bill, it would not give pensions to those not now entitled to them.

NASHVILLE PASTOR SLATED TO DELIVER SPRUNT LECTURES

The Rev. James I. Vance Will be Speaker Before Theological Seminary Students

North Carolina Presbyterians are greatly interested in the announcement of the 11th annual series of lectures on the James Sprunt foundation at Union Theological seminary, Richmond, Va., will be given by Rev. James I. Vance, D. D., pastor of the First Pres- byterian church, Nashville, Tenn., in Schaeffler hall on the seminary cam- pus on the evenings of January 17 to 24, inclusive. The general subject is "The Minister and His Message," and the topics of the eight lectures in the course are as follows: (1) A Poor Busi- ness But a Great Calling; (2) The Summons of Service; (3) The Preacher and a Bankrupt World; (4) The Preacher and His Message; (5) The Man Behind the Message; (6) The Preacher in Action; (7) The Drab and Gold in the Great Calling; and (8) The World's Greatest Preacher.

Since its establishment 11 years ago, this lectureship has not only brought to the seminary many men from abroad, like Dr. James Stalker, Sir William Ramsay and Dr. G. Campbell Morgan, but has had a singularly brilliant succession of lecturers from our own church, such as Prof. C. Alphonso Smith, Dr. Harris E. Kirk, Hon. Wil- liam J. Bryan, Prof. J. Gresham Mac- clier and others. To those who know Mr. Vance's gifts it is unnecessary to say that his lectures will continue the series worthily. The lectures will be published in book form immediately after their delivery.

Union seminary has always been noted for the proportion of its gradu- ates who are effective preachers, men of power in the pulpit. Dr. Vance is himself a graduate of the seminary in the class of 1886, and it is specially fitting that, after his own remarkable success as a preacher, he should come to give his younger brethren the ben- efit of his rich experience.
