Carolina Track Team Takes First Honors In Annual Track Meet

DURHAM, March 9.—The University of North Carolina's track team ran up a total of 112 points in the second annual indoor track meet held here tonight under the auspices of the North Carolina Olympic Games association winning easily. Trinity, ranking second, had only 21 points to her credit.

The feature to the collegiate events proved to be the running of Tench Cox, former Yale Olympic games star, and a member of the Carolina team. He made the 330-yard race in 2 minutes 8 1-5 seconds.

The Carolina team took first place in all but two events. One was the freshman 50-yard dash, won by Waldo, of Trinity. The other was the running high jump taken by Shankle, of Trinity, who vaulted 5 feet 5 3-4 inches.

The four places in the 440-yard race were taken by Carolina athletes. Carolina took the standing broad jump first place. Abernethy won the event with 10 feet 6 inches to his credit.

The Carolina medley team won through a wonderful finish by Captain Sinclair. In the one-mile race Ambler, of Carolina, made a brilliant dash for a victory.

The meet closed with two boxing bouts. One bout was between Carter, of Trinity, and Dixon, a Burlington militiaman, of the middleweight class. This bout was halted in the third round by the referee when the fighters passed blows during a clinch. In the second bout Tom Gallagher, Durham high school athlete, was given a newspaper decision over Smith, of South Carolina.

Charlotte Highs Win Track Meet Honors

DURHAM, March 9.—With a total of 20 points, the Charlotte high school won the silver loving cup awarded at the afternoon session of the second annual indoor track meet held here today. Schlitz, McMillan and Thomas, were the outstanding stars of the winning track team.

A feature to the meet was the shot put contest. In this event, the winner of the Chapel Hill high school, made a record of 39 feet, five and a half inches.

 LAKE CITY, March 9.—An enthusiastic meeting in independent warehousemen of the South Carolina belt, comprising South Carolina and North Carolina border markets, was held here Wednesday in the Builmore hotel to lay preliminary plans for the coming season. It was decided that a meeting of all independent warehousemen will be called to meet in Lake City Tuesday, March 13, at which time definite steps will be taken to launch the campaign for open marketing. One of the important matters to come before the meeting will be the establishment of a twice-a-month paper to carry the gospel of independent marketing to every tobacco grower in the belt.

Warehousemen present expressed themselves as more than pleased with the outlook and it was reported that a new independent warehouse is being built at Timmonsville by T. B. Pepper, that there will be two independent warehouses at Kingstree and two at Manning this year. It is planned within the next few weeks to hold mass meetings all over the tobacco belt at which time speakers will discuss every phase of the marketing question and opportunities offered for general discussion by all interested.

At the meeting next Tuesday prominent speakers will be present. Markets represented her today were Lake City, Dillon, Darlington, Fairmont, N. C., Whiteville, N. C., Lamar, Lake View, Timmonsville and Manning.
