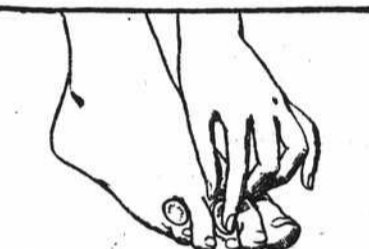
played and enjoyed and plans for the Schofield concert were discussed. Committees were formed to nominate officers to be voted upon in the next meeting for the ensuing year.
