Conference of Leaders Send Resolution to General Assembly of Cracker State

ATLANTA, July 5 .- Negroes as a race do not desire to leave Georgia and the

negro race here yesterday. The conference was presided over by Bishop J. S. Flipper of the African Methodist Episcepal church of Atlanta.

While declaring his opposition to itpassed by the federal government any migration of the negro, Bishop Flipper said he did believe the negro as well as any other race, ought to have the right to scatter to all parts of the union. The bishop, as well as other speakers, branded "social equality" and "negro supremacy" as bugaboos crated by political demagogues."

The communication, which is supposed to have been printed for distribution to members of the legislature and throughout the state generally, usets forth the evils which the negroes claim they labor under in this state. These
