PHILADELPHIA, July 9.—Benny Leonard, lightweight champion of the world, tonight defeated Alex Hart of Loraine, Pa., in the opinion of the majority of sports writers at the ringside party of an eight-round bout at the National baseball park. Approximately 30,000 persons, the largest crowd that ever witnessed a boxing exhibition in this city saw the match.
