Nehf, who shut out the Yankees, 1 to 0, in the third game of the series, is the only regular among the Giant boxmen who has not been pounded into submission. Alone he stands out as the last hope of the champions and Mc-Graw will send him to the ramparts tomorrow in a desperate effort to stem the tide of the remorseless Yankee machine.

But even if Nehf is returned victorious in his second appearance, the odds will all be in favor of the Amer-ican league champions: McGraw will have noresources left granting he wins with his ace, while Huggins is strongly entrenched with Sam Jones, who lost to Nehf, although he outpitched his rival; Herb Pennock, southpaw star who won the second game and saved yesterday's game when Shawkey weakened; and Waite Hoyt, victim of the Giants in the first game, who is confident he can come back and win. 
